- 1. Paul desired to reconnect, 15:36
- 2. Barnabas desired to take along John Mark. 15:37
- 3. Paul adamantly refused. (John Mark had been a quitter.) 15:38
- 4. The team members could not resolve their differences. 15:39a
- 5. Barnabas broke away from Paul. 15:39b
- 6. Some thoughts to consider:
 - a. Followup is always a good idea!
 - b. Some Christians are more interested in giving those who have failed a second chance.
 - c. Even the most committed Christians can disagree on policy.
 - d. Sometimes, despite our best efforts, we cannot keep our team together.

 - a. Paul chose Silas and left. 15:40a
 - b. The broader team supported them. 15:40b

- c. Paul and Silas followed the original game plan, just in a another area. 15:41
- 2. Paul added Timothy. 16:1-3
 - a. Your prospective team member may seem a bit unorthodox.16:1
 - 1) Younger
 - 2) Different culture
 - b. Your prospect needs a good reputation. 16:2
 - c. We always need a plan to train the younger generation! 16:3a
 - d. Your new team member may require some adjustments. 16:3b

C. Keeping in harmony with team rules. 16:4-5

- 1. It's good to follow team policies. 16:4
- 2. That's when we see the most growth. 16:5
