Avoiding Three Pitfalls That Would Divert Us From Christ

Study 6, Colossians 2:16-23

Introduction: The largely Gentile Christians in the city of Colosse were facing a bewildering attack from false teachers who were trying to impose their agenda on them.

One part of their agenda was to force the Christians to obey all the minutia of Jewish religious rituals. Another facet of their agenda was to use visions which they had supposedly seen which gave them a superior knowledge. Their knowledge was tempting the new Christians to focus on angels instead of on Jesus. A third part of their agenda emphasized asceticism - depriving oneself of legitimate pursuits in the name of "super-spirituality." We today may have slightly different issues, but the principles remain the same. Here is how Paul instructed the believers ...
