¹ 1:6 - will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus: Paul makes here a strong case for eternal security!

² 1:7 - partakers: Apparently somehow the Philippians served him in his imprisonment, perhaps by sending letters and visitors, who brought with them some money or items for his physical comfort. However, if this were true, surely Paul would have mentioned it. More likely, then, they helped him vicariously, through prayer, and more specifically by encouraging him through their continued sharing of the gospel with others and by themselves remaining steadfast in the faith.

 $^{^3}$ 1:19 - deliverance: Gk. σωτηρία. This may possibly refer rather to his ultimate salvation and rewards rather than his release from prison.

⁴ 1:19 - through your prayers: It is exciting to know that our prayers help accomplish things. To be sure, nothing would be done without God's work. On the other hand, He has declared that our prayers shall be part of the equation of Divine accomplishment!

 - E 1 His assurance of living: And convinced of this, I know that I shall remain and continue with you all 1:25

B 3 The Personal Challenge to Walk Worthy of the Gospel 1:27-30

 - D 1 The charge to live a worthy life: Only conduct yourselves ⁵ in a manner worthy of the **gospel** of Christ; ⁶

⁵ 1:27 - conduct yourselves: "let your conversation be" (KJV) (4176, *politeuomai*) -- to live as a (good) citizen, availing oneself of and conforming to the laws of the land. JTB, adapted from On-line Bible.

⁶ 1:27 - in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ: Worthily of the good news from and about Christ they are to live as good citizens here on the earth. That includes the concepts that they will be in the process of standing firm in one (S)(s)pirit, with one soul striving together for the faith of the good news.

⁷ 1:27 - you are standing firm: (*stekete*, PIA, 2 pl from *steko*, 4739). Here, Paul hopes he will hear that they are in the process of standing firm in one spirit, in one soul striving together for the faith of the good news. The emphasis seems to be one of standing firm in unity, guided by the Holy Spirit.

² Thess. 2:15 So then, brethren, **stand firm** and hold to the traditions which you were taught, whether by word of mouth or by letter from us.

¹ Cor. 16:13 Be on the alert, **stand firm** in the faith, act like men, be strong.

- E 2 with one mind striving together ⁸ for the faith ⁹ of the **gospel**;
- C 2 Coping with suffering -- His reminder that opponents serve as a sign of their own destruction and the Philippians' salvation 1:28
 - D 1 Rebuffing antagonism: in no way alarmed ¹⁰ by your opponents ¹¹
 - D 2 Understanding antagonism
 - E 1 which is a sign ¹² of destruction ¹³ for them,

Gal. 5:1 It was for freedom that Christ set us free; therefore **keep standing firm** and do not be subject again to a yoke of slavery.

Php. 4:1 Therefore, my beloved brethren ... so **stand firm** in the Lord

¹ Thess. 3:8 for now we really live, if you **stand firm** in the Lord.

⁸ 1:27 - striving together: (*sunathleo* 4866), to strive at the same time with another, from the verb *athleo* (118), to engage in a contest, contend in public games, contend for a prize. *Athleo* has the idea of competing vigorously in a game. *Sunathleo* means that you are teammates, competing for a common goal, here emphasized by the inclusion of "with one mind!" Of course, the goal here is the faith (or truth?) of the gospel. In the only other occurrence of this word, Paul asks one of the Philippian brothers to help Euodia and Syntyche, women who have competed (as teammates alongside) with Paul in the cause of the gospel (Php. 4:3).

⁹ 1:27 - faith of the gospel: What does this mean? Are they to strive together with unanimity so that they themselves believe in the gospel? [But don't they already believe in the gospel?] Or are they to strive so that *others* believe the gospel?

¹⁰ 1:28 - alarmed: *pturomenoi*, "terrified," (Pres. Pass. Ptcpl. NMP from *pturo*, 4426, meaning to terrify.) NAS, "in no way alarmed." This word is closely related to ptuo, a primary verb meaning "to spit." We have an interesting expression, "scared spitless," which may have something in common. The connection may be that just as the spit suddenly leaves one's mouth, a scared Roman would take off running if he were terrified.

^{11 1:28 -} opponents: (antikeimenon - Pres. Ptcpl, Gen. MP from [antikeimai 480] middle voice): lit., to be laid down against or set against. Bagster: To occupy an opposite position. This is a deliberate action of opposition.

¹² 1:28 - sign: (1732 endeixis) "demonstration, proof: i.e. manifestation made by act, i.e. sign evidence" (On-Line Bible). In 2 Cor. 8, Paul is urging the Corinthians to make good on their earlier willingness to give money to the poor Jewish Christians in Jerusalem. He says, "Therefore openly before the churches show them the **proof** of your love and of our reason for boasting about you." (2 Cor. 8:24).

^{13 1:28 -} destruction: (684 *apoleia*) - complete destruction. Sometimes referring to the wasting of something precious (Mark 14:3-4 - 3 And while He was in Bethany at the home of Simon the leper, and reclining at the table, there came a woman with an alabaster vial of very costly perfume of pure nard; and she broke the vial and poured it over His head. 4 But some were indignantly remarking to one another, "Why has this perfume been **wasted**?") or of money (Acts 8:18-20 18 Now when Simon saw that the Spirit was bestowed through the laying on of the apostles' hands, he offered them money, 19 saying, "Give this authority to me as well, so that everyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit." 20 But Peter said to him, "May your silver **perish** with you, because you thought you could obtain the gift of God with money!") or physical death by execution (Acts 25:16 KJV only - To whom I answered, "It is not the manner of Romans to deliver any man to **die** before that he which is accused have the accusers face to face, and have license to answer for himself concerning the crime laid against him."), but more often of eternal human destruction (as in Heb. 10:39 - But we are not of those who shrink back to **destruction**, but of those who have faith to the preserving of the soul.) and in 2 Pet. 3:7 - But the present heavens and earth by His word are being reserved for fire,kept for the day of judgment and **destruction** of ungodly men.). In each case the commodity or substance or person is completely destroyed with nothing left to salvage.

 - D 1 The authorization of suffering: For to you it has been granted ¹⁵
 - D 2 The purpose of suffering: for Christ's sake,

 - D 4 The necessity of suffering: but also to suffer ¹⁶ for His sake,

A 2 THE PLEA TO DUPLICATE THE MIND-SET (OUTLOOK) OF CHRIST: Think As Christ Thinks 2:1-18

B 1 The Exhortation to the Philippians to Duplicate the Love, Thinking, Unity, and Humility Found in the Messiah 2:1-4

¹⁴ 1:28 - salvation: (4991 *soteria*)

^{15 1:29 &}quot;granted," echaristhe 1Aor Ind Pass 3S (from 5483 charizomai, derived from 5485 charis), meaning "to do something pleasant or agreeable (to one), to do a favor, to gratify" (On-Line Bible). Usually translated "to forgive" (KJV). When God is the gracious giver, the giving or granting is something beneficial to the recipient. When men do the giving, a person might not be better off. In Acts 25:11 Festus, wishing to ingratiate himself with the Jews, offered to have Paul tried in Jerusalem. Knowing that he would be assassinated, Paul replied, "If then I am a wrongdoer, and have committed anything worthy of death, I do not refuse to die; but if none of those things is true of which these men accuse me, **no one can hand me over** to them. I appeal to Caesar." In Philippians 2:9, "Therefore also God highly exalted Him (Christ), and **bestowed** on Him the name which is above every name." It would seem that in the present passage, God has graciously given us the privilege, not only of believing on Jesus, but also of suffering for Him! Here both believing in Jesus and suffering for Him are seen as a privilege from God! The obvious LESSON is that we need to accept suffering for Jesus as part of God's plan for us; and we ought to count it a privilege to suffer for Jesus as well as believe on Him! In James 1:2-3 we are to "Consider it all joy ... when [we] encounter various trials, knowing that the testing of [our] faith produces endurance." The trial (3986 peirasmos) in this context is seen as "adversity, affliction, trouble: sent by God and serving to test or prove one's character, faith, holiness." (On-Line Bible)

¹⁶ 1:29 "to suffer" *paschein* (Pres. Act. Infin. from *pascho* 3958). To undergo wrong or injury or hardship. 1 Peter 2:21-23 21 "For you have been called for this purpose, since Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example for you to follow in His steps, 22 WHO COMMITTED NO SIN, NOR WAS ANY DECEIT FOUND IN HIS MOUTH; 23 and while being reviled, He did not revile in return; while suffering, He uttered no threats, but kept entrusting Himself to Him who judges righteously."

¹⁷ 1:30 - conflict: (*agona* - Accus. Sing. from 74 *agon*): "The assembly of the Greeks at their national games; hence the contest for a prize at their games; generally, any struggle or contest...." (On-Line Bible). We, of course get our English word agony from this word. It has the idea of giving a maximum effort to the point of great pain in order to triumph over an obstacle. In the present context, Paul expected the Philippian Christians to share in the honor and discipline and exertion of being able to suffer for Christ! Cf. Heb. 12: "Therefore, since we have so great a cloud of witnesses surrounding us, let us also lay aside every encumbrance, and the sin which so easily entangles us, and let us run with endurance the race (*agon*) that is set before us." (NASV)

- C 1 Be compassionately unified (completing Paul's joy) 2:1-2
 - D 1 The existence of unifying compassion in Christ 2:1
 - E 1 If therefore there is any encouragement in Christ,
 - E 2 if there is any consolation of love,
 - E 3 if there is any fellowship of the Spirit,
 - E 4 if any affection and compassion, ¹⁸
 - D 2 Paul's joyful insistence on their duplicating those qualities: make my joy complete by 2:2
 - E 1 being of the same mind, ¹⁹
 - E 2 maintaining the same love,
 - E 3 united in spirit,
 - E 4 intent on one purpose. 2:2
- C 2 Be not self-exalting: The **forbidden** selfish arrogance: Do nothing 2:3a
 - D 1 from selfishness
 - D 2 or empty conceit 20
- C 3 Be others-honoring: The **commanded** humble deference 2:3b
 - D 1 but with humility of mind
 - D 2 let each of you regard one another as more important than himself; ²¹
- C 4 Be others-concerned-for 2:4
 - D 1 The forbidden selfishness: do not merely look out for your own personal interests,

 $^{^{18}}$ 2:1 - affection and compassion: Encouragement, love, fellowship, affection, and compassion all inhere in Christ. 2:1

¹⁹ 2:2 - being of the same mind: Christians are exhorted to duplicate the same encouragement, love, spiritual unity, and purpose to be affectionate and compassionate. Furthermore, Christians are to encourage others by exhibiting love and unity.

²⁰ 2:3 - selfishness or empty conceit: Christians are to do nothing out of selfish ambition or empty conceit. Christians are never to be selfish or indulge in empty self-glory.

 $^{^{21}}$ 2:3 - more important than himself: Christians are to view others as more important than themselves. 2:3

D 2 The commanded "others - orientation": but also for the interests of others. 2:4 22

B 2 The Example of the Messiah 2:5-11

- C 1 His humility 2:5-8
 - D 1 The command to duplicate the attitude exemplified by Jesus the Messiah: Have this attitude in yourselves ²³ which was also in Christ Jesus, 2:5
 - D 2 The self-abasement of Him Who existed in the Form of God 2:6-8
 - E 1 His existence in the form of God: who, although He existed in the form of God, 2:6
 - E 2 He did not deem equality with God something to be seized by force: did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped, ²⁴ 2:6
 - E 3 He emptied Himself: but emptied Himself, 2:7
 - G 1 Taking the form of a slave: taking the form of a bond-servant,
 - G 2 Made in the likeness and appearance of men
 - H 1 and being made in the likeness of men.
 - H 2 And being found in appearance as a man,
 - E 4 He humbled Himself to the point of death on the cross 2:8
 - G 1 The statement of self-humbling: He humbled Himself
 - G 2 The explanation of self-humbling: by becoming obedient to the point of death, ²⁵ even death on a cross.

²² 2:4 - the interests of others: Christians are not merely to look out for their own interests, but also those of others. 2:4 Christians are not to be self-centered, but others-centered. 2:3-4

²³ 2:5 - Have this attitude in yourselves: Christians are to have the same attitude Christ exhibited (2:5-8). In addition, we Christians are to lead Christ-like lives.

²⁴ 2:6 - did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped: Christians cannot insist on maintaining positions of power and status; 2:6

²⁵ 2:8 - obedient to the point of death: Rather than seeking positions of power, Christians must, in humility, reach down to be a slave of others (2:7-8). We Christians must never act to protect our position, but must act to serve others.

²⁶ 2:11 - confess that Jesus Christ is Lord: All rational created beings will one day acknowledge Christ's Sovereignty over them, willingly or unwillingly. Mohammed will have to confess that Jesus is greater than he. Hitler will bow to Jesus and be held accountable for the millions of Jews he murdered. Joseph Stalin will bow before Jesus and confess to the sixty million Russians and Ukrainians he sent to their premature deaths by his policies. Carl Sagan will be forced to bow in humility and admit that Jesus created the universe. There was no Big Bang and no Evolution. Every Pope will be forced to admit that it was Jesus, not he himself, who had authority over Jesus' Church. And each one of us will have to give an accounting of himself to Jesus. It will be a supremely sobering moment in human history.

²⁷ 2:11 - to the glory of God the Father: A principle and several applications are in order here: PRINCIPLE: God rewarded Christ by exalting Him after His humility. APPLICATION: Because God rewarded Christ by exalting Him after His humility, we Christians can also expect a reward of exaltation after humble service. 2:9-11. APPLICATION: As we believers serve Christ in humility, He will honor us at the proper time. 2:9-11 APPLICATION: Meanwhile, our goal is to bring glory to God the Father by submitting to Christ and bringing others to that same submission. 2:9-11 APPLICATION: Meanwhile, our goal is to bring glory to God the Father by submitting to Christ and bringing others to that same submission. 2:9-11

B 1 Paul's Plan to Send Timothy 2:19-23

- C 1 To gain an uplifting report of their welfare 2:19
 - D 1 Paul's plan: But I hope in the Lord Jesus to send Timothy to you shortly,
 - D 2 Paul's concern: so that I also may be encouraged when I learn of your condition.

- C 3 Because of others' self-seeking character 2:21 For they all seek after their own interests, not those of Christ Jesus.
- C 4 Because of Timothy's known character of child-like service in the gospel 2:22
 - D 1 His proven worth: But you know of his proven worth
 - D 2 His service in evangelism: that he served with me in the furtherance of the gospel
 - D 3 His enthusiastic commitment to the task: like a child serving his father.
- C 5 The timing: Timothy to be sent as soon as Paul knows how his trial turns out 2:23 Therefore I hope to send him immediately, as soon as I see how things go with me.;
- **B 2** Paul's Plan to Come Himself: and I trust in the Lord that I myself also shall be coming shortly; 2:24

B3 Paul's Joy-Motivated Decision to Send Epaphroditus 2:25-30

- C 1 The decision to send Epaphroditus: But I thought it necessary to send to you Epaphroditus, 2:25
- C 2 The qualifications of Epaphroditus: 2:25
 - D 1 my brother
 - D 2 and fellow worker
 - D 3 and fellow soldier,
 - D 4 who is also your messenger
 - D 5 and minister to my need;
- C 3 Epaphroditus' sickness 2:26-27
 - D 1 His desire to show himself healed to the concerned Philippians 2:26
 - E 1 His longing: because he was longing for you all
 - E 2 His distress: and was distressed because you had heard that he was sick.
 - D 2 His deathly sickness 2:27a for indeed he was sick to the point of death
 - D 3 God's merciful healing 2:27b
 - E 1 Toward Epaphroditus: but God had mercy on him,
 - E 2 Toward Paul: and not on him only but also on me, lest I should have sorrow upon sorrow.
- C 4 The request to receive him 2:28-30
 - D 1 With joy 2:28-29a
 - E 1 Therefore I have sent him all the more eagerly in order that when you see him again you may rejoice and I may be less concerned about you. 2:28
 - E 2 Therefore receive him in the Lord with all joy 2:29a
 - D 2 With honor 2:29b-30
 - E 1 The exhortation 2:29b and hold men like him in high regard;

- E 2 His motive 2:30
 - G 1 Working for Christ: because he came close to death for the work of Christ.
 - G 2 Endangering his life: risking his life
 - G 3 Serving others: to complete what was deficient in your service to me.

A 4 THE PLEA TO SACRIFICE CONFIDENCE IN FLESHLY ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN ORDER TO PROFIT FROM CHRIST AND KNOW HIM: "Sacrifice to know Christ!" 3:1 - 4:1

B 1 The Preliminary Exhortation to Rejoice in Christ 3:1a

- C 1 The exhortation: Finally, my brethren, rejoice in the Lord.
- C 2 The necessity of writing: To write the same things again is no trouble to me, and it is a safeguard for you.

B 2 Paul's Warning against Flesh-Glorying Legalists (Circumcision-Requirers) 3:1b-3

- C 1 The warning against "dogs" and "evil workmen" 3:2
 - D 1 Beware of the dogs,
 - D 2 beware of the evil workers,
 - D 3 beware of the false circumcision:
- C 2 The reason: Trusters in Christ, not the flesh, are the true circumcision 3:3
 - D 1 The true identity: for we are the true circumcision,
 - D 2 The spiritual worship: who worship in the Spirit of God
 - D 3 The Messianic glory: and glory in Christ Jesus
 - D 4 The abstention from fleshly confidence: and put no confidence in the flesh

B 3 Paul's Example of Sacrificing Human Merit to Profit from Christ 3:4-14

- C 1 The **superiority** of his claim to fame in fleshly credits 3:4-6
 - D 1 His superiority asserted 3:4 although I myself might have confidence even in the flesh. If anyone else has a mind to put confidence in the flesh, I far more:

- D 2 His credentials listed 3:5-6
 - E 1 His legal circumcision: circumcised the eighth day, 3:5
 - E 2 His Israeli nationality: of the nation of Israel,
 - E 3 His Benjamite ancestry: of the tribe of Benjamin,
 - E 4 His Hebrew parentage and speech: a Hebrew of Hebrews;
 - E 5 His Pharisaic legalism: as to the Law, a Pharisee;
 - E 6 His religious zeal (persecuting the church): as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; 3:6
 - E 7 His blameless keeping of the Law: as to the righteousness which is in the Law, found blameless.
- C 2 His **policy** of sacrificing all fleshly credits for the excellence of knowing Messiah Jesus 3:7-8a
 - D 1 His past counting of his gain for loss: But whatever things were gain to me, those things I have counted as loss for the sake of Christ. 3:7
 - D 2 His ongoing policy of counting of all things as loss: More than that, I count all things to be loss 3:8a
 - D 3 His superlative trade-off! in view of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord,
 - D 4 His involuntary deprivation: for whom I have suffered the loss ²⁸ of all things,
 - D 5 His ongoing policy of discounting personal glory: and count them but rubbish
- C 3 The **goal** of his sacrificing 3:8b-11
 - D 1 To gain (accrue profit from) Christ: in order that I may gain Christ. 3:8b
 - D 2 To be found in Christ: and may be found in Him, 3:9
 - E 1 Not having an "of the Law" righteousness: not having a righteousness of my own derived from the Law,

²⁸ 3:8 - I have suffered the loss: lit. have experienced the loss. The verb (*edzemio'then*) is passive voice -- Paul did not here make a deliberate sacrifice; rather, the loss was exacted involuntarily upon him. Probably a reference to his capture and two-year-plus imprisonment by the Romans at the instigation of the Jews (Acts 21:27 ff.)

- E 2 But having an "of God" righteousness coming through faith in Christ 3:9
 - G 1 The object of the righteousness: but that which is through faith in Christ,
 - G 2 The source of the righteousness: the righteousness which comes from God
 - G 3 The securing of the righteousness: on the basis of faith,

 - E 1 Christ: that I may know Him,

- D 4 To attain to the "out-resurrection" from among the dead ones: in order that I may attain to the resurrection from the dead. 3:11
- C 4 The **timing** of his achieving his goals in relation to fellowship with Christ 3:12a, 13a
 - D 1 He has not already received: (1) Not that I have already obtained it. 3:12a
 - D 2 He has not already been perfected: (2) or have already become perfect, 3:12a
 - D 3 He does not consider himself yet to have laid hold of Christ: (4) Brethren, I do not regard myself as having laid hold of it yet; 3:13a
- C 5 The **intensity** of his striving for his goal of complete fellowship with Christ 3:12b, 13b-14
 - D 1 His pursuit of the goal: (3) but I press on in order that I may lay hold of that for which also I was laid hold of by Christ Jesus. 3:12b
 - D 2 His disregard for the past: (6) forgetting what lies behind 3:13b
 - D 3 His stretching for the future: (7) and reaching forward to what lies ahead,
 - D 4 His pursuit of the prize of the "upward-calling" of God in Messiah Jesus (The one thing he does!): (5) but one thing I do: (3:13b) (8) I

press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. 3:14

B 4 Paul's Urging Other to Duplicate His Attitudes and Actions 3:15 - 4:1

- C 1 The exhortation to mature Christians to have the same goal with respect to Christ as he does 3:15-16
 - D 1 Unencumbered with confidence in the flesh 3:15
 - E 1 Let us therefore, as many as are perfect, have this attitude;
 - E 2 and if in anything you have a different attitude, God will reveal that also to you;
 - D 2 Walking according to knowledge already gained: however, let us keep living by that same standard to which we have attained. 3:16
- C 2 The command to imitate Paul's attitudes and actions in all things 3:17-21
 - D 1 The command 3:17
 - E 1 Imitate Paul: Brethren, join in following my example,
 - E 2 Imitate Paul's imitators: and observe those who walk according to the pattern you have in us.
 - D 2 The reasons 3:18-21
 - E 1 The negative reason 3:18-19
 - G 1 The existence of many so-called Christians who are really enemies: For many walk, of whom I often told you, and now tell you even weeping, that they are enemies of the cross of Christ, 3:18
 - G 2 Their characteristics 3:19
 - H 1 Their destiny -- destruction: whose end is destruction,
 - H 2 Their god -- the belly: whose god is their appetite,
 - H 3 Their glory -- shame: and whose glory is in their shame,
 - H 4 Their thoughts -- earthly things: who set their minds on earthly things.
 - E 2 The positive reason: because of our heavenly destiny 3:20-21

- G 1 Our citizenship -- in the heavens: For our citizenship is in heaven, 3:20
- G 2 Our Savior, the Master, Jesus, Messiah -- whom we await from the heavens: from which also we eagerly wait for a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ;
- G 3 Our prospect -- the glorification of our bodies presently in humiliation 3:21
 - H 1 Transformation: who will transform the body of our humble state
 - H 2 Glorification: into conformity with the body of His glory,
 - H 3 Facilitation: by the exertion of the power that He has
 - H 4 Subjugation: even to subject all things to Himself.
- C 3 The final command to the Philippians (Paul's source of joy and reward / achievement) to stand in the Lord 4:1
 - D 1 Paul's veneration
 - E 1 Admiration: Therefore, my beloved brethren
 - E 2 Anticipation: whom I long to see,
 - E 3 Motivation: my joy and crown,
 - D 2 Paul's exhortation: so stand firm in the Lord, my beloved.

B 1 The Exhortation to Unity 4:2-3

- C 1 To Euodia and Syntyche: I urge Euodia and I urge Syntyche to live in harmony in the Lord 4:2

 - D 1 The request for assistance: Indeed, true comrade, I ask you also to help these women
 - D 2 Their eligibility for assistance
 - E 1 Their labor: who have shared my struggle in the cause of the gospel,

- E 2 Their favorable comparison with other of Paul's helpers
 - G 1 together with Clement also,
 - G 2 and the rest of my fellow workers,
- E 3 Their eternal security: whose names are in the book of life.

 - C 1 Their renewed concern: But I rejoiced in the Lord greatly, that now at last you have revived your concern for me;
 - C 2 Their new opportunity: Indeed, you were concerned before, but you lacked opportunity.

B 2 Paul's Disclaimer of Dire Need 4:11-13

C 1 His learned ability to be content in any circumstance 4:11

- D 1 His disclaimer of need: Not that I speak from want;
- D 2 His learned contentment: for I have learned to be content in whatever circumstances I am.
- C 2 His ability to adapt to humbling situations and prosperity 4:12
 - D 1 Coping with little: I know how to get along with humble means, ³⁰
 - D 2 Coping with plenty: and I also know how to live in prosperity;
 - D 3 The secret of contentment: in any and every circumstance I have learned the secret
 - E 1 of being filled and going hungry,
 - E 2 both of having abundance and suffering need.
- C 3 His ability to accomplish all things in Christ: I can do all things through Him who strengthens me. 4:13

B 3 Paul's Commendation of Their Gift 4:14-18

- C 1 Because of their consequent fellowship with him in his affliction: Nevertheless, you have done well to share with me in my affliction. 4:14
- C 2 Because of their past excellence in sharing with him 4:15-16
 - D 1 They were the only church to share with him 4:15
 - E 1 The time of their sharing: And you yourselves also know, Philippians,
 - G 1 that at the first preaching of the gospel,
 - G 2 after I departed from Macedonia,
 - E 2 The singularity of their sharing: no church shared with me in the matter of giving and receiving but you alone;
 - D 2 They shared with him in Thessalonica: for even in Thessalonia you sent a gift more than once for my needs. 4:16
- C 3 Paul's desire for spiritual progress credited to their account 4:17

³⁰ 4:12 - get along with humble means: Missionary friends of ours have learned how to cope with humble circumstances -- living in the jungle; and coping with plenty -- returning to America. If we American Christians were faced with debilitating need, could we learn to cope? Have we become so accustomed to a luxurious style of living, that if God wanted us to move into a situation where we could be of greater service to Him, we would be willing to do that? Or have we grown so attached to our conveniences, our toys, that we would choose to tell God, "Sorry, no can do!!?"

- D 1 What his motivation is not: Not that I seek the gift itself,

 - D 2 His acknowledgment of their gift: having received from Epaphroditus what you have sent,
 - D 3 His description of their gift
 - E 1 a fragrant aroma,
 - E 2 an acceptable sacrifice,
 - E 3 well-pleasing to God.

B 4 Paul's Promise of God's Supply of Their Needs 4:19

- C 1 The promise of God's supply: And my God shall supply all your needs
- C 2 The standard of God's supply: according to His riches in glory
- C 3 The sphere of God's supply: in Christ Jesus.

B 5 Paul's Glorification of God 4:20

- C 1 His description of God: Now to our God and Father
- C 2 His honoring God: be the glory forever and ever. Amen.

A 7 CLOSING GREETINGS 4:21-23

B 1 Greetings from Paul and Company 4:21

- C 1 Greetings from Paul: Greet every saint in Christ Jesus.
